Yeah, look at the publishing industry. What changes we have seen in the very idea of a book, both in its physical form as well as in the user interface.

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
Although this is mass produced, it has possibility of so much customization.

Well, yes.

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
Data visualization is another area, where designers are actively involved.

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
Designers work through large amount of data, making it accessible to the people who need that information.

Many things are changing, including manufacturing processes.

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

So, what about designers?


Designers are increasingly dependent less and less on big capital or sponsors. Designers can now upload their proposals on crowd funding platforms.
